You are the reason Coastguard volunteers show up, no matter what.

Whether they're the calm voice at the other end of the radio, the helping hand pulling people to safety or the eyes in our skies, lives are saved all thanks to you.

Coastguard volunteers do all they can to save lives at sea. And operating two aircraft to search over large areas is one of them. A rescue mission Air Patrol volunteer Banu will never forget took place on a clear afternoon.

"We were already in the air and in the middle of an assessment with Alex, one of our trainees, when we got the distress call around 4pm. A Dad and his two children were kayaking out in Kaiaua in the Firth of Thames and had capsized in freezing waters," recalls Banu.

Banu and Andrew (who was the pilot that day) knew they had to help. You made this happen. You made sure they could be there for this family that day. Thank you.

Coastguard Air Patrol were close and headed straight for the search zone. On the way Andrew radioed the two helicopters that were also helping with the search to map out clear flying areas. This not only made sure every inch of the search area was covered but also eliminated any risk of collision.

Banu was in the back of the aircraft making sure the search equipment needed was ready and at hand - binoculars, sea dyes and flares.

She also helped trainee Alex with radio calls and getting the information they needed to find the missing family quickly.

On the ground Waikato Police were coordinating the search

with two rescue vessels from Coastguard Maraetai and Coastguard Thames scouring the area for the capsized kayak. It got windier and the sea rougher as the search went on, which made it difficult to see the family in the water.

It was up to Andrew, Banu and Alex to use their eyes from the sky.

Sticking to their fly zone, the Air

Patrol crew flew low, at 500 feet, and slowly, at a speed of 80 knots, to give them the best chance of spotting them.

On the third leg of their search and about half an hour later they spotted the empty yellow kayak. Within a minute, they saw a person in the water wearing a lifejacket, huddled with a child. They couldn't make out whether the Dad had both children or just one, so without a second to spare the crew radioed in their sighting to the search coordinators.

From above, the crew could see the family were struggling and needed help immediately. Banu grabbed the orange sea dye crystals and gave them to Alex to make the drop.

It is something Air Patrol train for. Dropping crystals out of a window in windy conditions requires practice, skill and precision. It has to be a swift downward motion so it doesn't get blown back into the aircraft tail. With a steady hand, Alex dropped the orange crystals near the family, turning the water green to mark exactly where the family was. Coastguard volunteers on the

water saw the dye straight away and had the family on board their rescue boat in minutes.

The children were in a critical condition and needed urgent medical attention. They sped across the water to the helicopter waiting at the boat ramp to take them to hospital.

If there is ever a question over what your 'why' is, this rescue was a good reminder.

SeaKayakerCapsize

Quick thinking and action by the volunteer crew at Coastguard Sumner meant a sea kayaker who capsized in the surf near Heathcote Estuary got home safely. Hamilton Jet Rescue was launched quickly and the young man was pulled to safety soon after. He had swallowed a lot of sea water and was hypothermic. So the crew removed his wet clothes and wrapped him in blankets while waiting for an ambulance.

One person was pulled to safety by another waka crew, while the remaining five spent about 40 minutes in the freezing water before Coastguard Taranaki arrived to haul them to safety.
